Sign up to Zero Waste Challenge Week

How much rubbish do you produce in a week? Well on average each household in Gloucestershire puts out the equivalent of 100 black bags of waste every year. If all of this rubbish were piled up, it would be taller than Gloucester cathedral!

Of some 316,000 tonnes of household waste produced in the county each year, over half ends up in landfill. This can't continue. Burying waste underground is both environmentally damaging and very expensive. We also have to take into account that both landfill sites are filling up fast and could be full by 2016!

So when it comes to the waste you produce- just how low can you go? The County Council's Zero Waste Challenge Week, which takes place between January 26th and February 1st, aims to encourage everyone to reduce the amount of waste they produce in the first place, as well as reuse, recycle and compost as much as possible.

We want everyone to create little or no rubbish in one week. It doesn't matter if no one reaches zero. It is the taking part that counts. To sign up to the challenge visit <u>www.recycleforgloucestershire.com</u> and follow the Zero Waste links.

To help you get through the week, here's 5 tips...

- 1. Plan meals in advance. Take a shopping list to the supermarket and only buy what you need.
- 2. Try and visit more local shops, such as the bakery, green grocers and butchers. These shops often have less packaged products.

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- 3. Take your own packed lunch to work and use a container rather than cling film.
- 4. Reuse bottles for soft drinks.
- 5. Compost uncooked food waste (excluding meat and fish) and garden waste at home.

Single parent Dr Kate Edgar has already signed up to Zero Waste Challenge Week. The Clinical Psychologist, who lives in Gloucester with her 5-yearold son Harry, admits she didn't used to recycle much. Kate already makes use of the <u>www.freecycle.org.uk</u> to reduce her waste. "If you have something that would otherwise end up going to the tip, then this site enables other people to take it off your hands." Kate has also encouraged workplace colleagues to go green, by reusing old printer cartridges, as well as composting organic waste.

Students at the University of Gloucestershire are being encouraged to recycle in the run up to Christmas.

The University of Gloucestershire Students' Union have been working with Cheltenham Borough Council to make recycling as easy as possible for students living in the St Paul's area.

The council have provided clear plastic recycling bags which students will pick up from the Students' Union offices and there will be special collections on the 6th and 13th December. Give your compost bin a present this Christmas!

Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust is encouraging people to compost as much as possible this Christmas. All those vegetable peelings for a start -sprouts, parsnips, carrots and potato peelings can all be composted at home. To balance out the vegetable peelings don't forget to add wrapping paper, along with cardboard packaging, and how about those shredded receipts from all that Christmas shopping. Other festive items that can head to the compost are cardboard tubes from the kitchen foil, cracker jokes ("How do worms send their Christmas cards? Through the com-post!"), party hats, streamers, pine needles and envelopes. Just scrunch them all up and add them to the mix. By the time summer comes around you will be using your Christmas waste as valuable compost on the garden, and helping wildlife in the process.

After Christmas why not continue the good work and sign up for Gloucestershire's Zero Waste Challenge and help Gloucestershire reduce the amount of waste that ends up in landfill. Zero waste week will be held from 26th January to 1st February 2009.

A Talk by Peter Bunyard

Peter Bunyard is a freelance author and environmentalist, and was the founding science editor of the Ecologist magazine. He has worked as consultant editor for the United Nations Environment Programme review on Industry and the Environment, and was secretary and editor of the Committee for the Study of Nuclear Economics. A fellow of the Linnean Society, he has conducted field work in the Colombian Amazon on the role of rainforests in global warming. He has recently released his book "Extreme Weather" published by Floris Books of Edinburgh and is currently lecturing in Colombia and the United States on the significance of the Amazon Rainforest for our climate.

Climate Change March Report

Within the central streets of London on Saturday 6th, Campaign Against Climate Change hosted the National Climate Change March, to which has now become a key annual event in acting as a statement of unity against the detrimental effects of fossil fuel consumption, upon the environment and that of developing countries and their economy.

Although numbers had noticeably dwindled in comparison to last year's rally, thousands of people proceeded to march from Grosvenor Square with an array of banners and pickets protesting their cause marking a need for political change!



The key focuses of the rally were that of unified opinion against new coal-fired power stations (in particular Kingsnorth, Kent); the use of biofuels as an alternative resource, which effectively accelerates the process of enhanced greenhouse effect through deforestation, landuse change and emissions associated with fertilizers; the third runway expansion of Heathrow and the fourth theme was to show support for the large scale investment in renewables.

The march arrived at its finale within Parliament Square whereby as a sign of reform to our UK Government, crowds and established speakers of the field supporting the climate change movement stood outside the chambers expressing their demand for political and social revolution against the Western world's greedy and unjust 'need' for fossil fuel consumption.

Korsham Alab, in light of his representation of activism in Bangladesh, was a personal favourite with his stance on unnatural climatic changes upon the more vulnerable communities of his country.

He stated that said population has become victim to the effects of climate change through that of rising sea levels on coastal areas, but they do not even have adequate enough resources to consume such large volumes of fossil fuel.
