AMAN IMAN – WATER IS LIFE – AN EXHIBITION FROM VISION 21, FUNDED BY SEVERN TRENT WATER

Vision 21 is launching, on Friday 24th April, a new touring exhibition, Aman Iman – Water is Life. The exhibition has kindly been funded by Severn Trent Water and is focussed on water and sustainability.

The exhibition will travel around Gloucestershire as we approach the second anniversary of the flood of July 2007. It will visit towns and villages that were affected by the deluge of water.

This outreach project seeks to address water related issues on a local and global scale and examines the role climate change plays in this. The exhibition endeavours to highlight how vital water is in our lives, raise awareness on using water sustainably and reducing emissions and thus engender behavioural change in our resource use. Vision 21 hopes that the exhibition will encourage awareness and debate on water as a resource in Gloucestershire and why we all have a part to play in using it carefully.

The exhibition will visit many parts of Gloucestershire over coming months starting with the Playhouse Theatre in Cheltenham which was affected by the flooding twice during 2007. Paul Scott from the Playhouse said "We're very pleased to be the first venue to host this important exhibition, especially as we know from our own experience just how devastating an impact severe weather and floods can have - not just at the time but for months afterwards."

Andrew Marsh of Severn Trent Water said "Water is precious on both a local and global scale. If you want a safe, healthy drink, you can't do better than reach for a glass of tap water - it makes sense for our health and for our environment."

BOURTON ON THE WATER AWARDED FAIRTRADE VILLAGE STATUS

Fairtrade judges were impressed with the range of small businesses involved, the action in schools, and the way the churches and community worked together



during Fairtrade fortnight. There is a wonderful range of Fairtrade and fairly traded goods on offer which is an outstanding achievement for a small village.

Perhaps a million or more cups of tea are drunk in

Bourton each year but what's the difference if it's Fairtrade or not? Well for example, the woman who grows Fairtrade tea for your breakfast can rest assured she can get a guaranteed price for her products. It makes a real difference to have Fairtrade contracts that help producers to cope with market forces and exchange rate pressures. Instead of being at the mercy of loan sharks, being part of a Fairtrade group means that farmers or craft workers could have help with loans at fair interest rates as prices of essential inputs like seeds increase.

IMPROVED RECYCLING FOR GLOUCESTER RESIDENTS

A new, improved recycling service will allow residents in Gloucester to send less rubbish to the local landfill site.

The new scheme will be introduced during the winter and will include the recycling of materials not previously collected such as kitchen food waste, mixed plastic bottles, and also small domestic batteries.

Around 20% of household rubbish is food waste that under the new scheme will be collected weekly.

In addition, mixed plastic bottles will be added to the list of items that can be put into the kerbside 'green boxes', and the garden waste green bin service will be extended across the whole of the city – to homes where this is possible. For full article <u>click here</u>

NEW WAY TO RECYCLE YELLOW PAGES IN STROUD

For the first time residents will be able to recycle their old Yellow Pages by placing them in the green kerbside recycling boxes or at one of Stroud District Council's paper banks. In the past papers mills were reluctant to accept Yellow Pages directories as they contained a yellow dye. However, they are now being manufactured without this dye so the mill S.D.C. send them to, Aylesford Newsprint, can recycle them.

To launch this exciting recycling development, 12 schools in the district will be taking part in the Yellow Woods Challenge which aims to get the pupils to recycle as many old directories as possible. The Yellow Pages have provided financial support for four prizes totaling £700. Pupils at Thrupp Primary School were thrilled to meet woodland creature Kirk, the competition mascot, who called in at the School to help launch the challenge.

What can parishes do to help nature?

The problem is that the norm in Gloucestershire is twicea-year mechanical cutting. Cutting early reduces flowering and could harm grass nesting birds, second cutting before seeds have set stops new plants happening and weakens the existing plants. Just 30 years ago the verges in summer had a profusion of wild flowers and meadow grasses and so there were plentiful butterflies, bees, and other insects. EXHIBITION: THE FLOOD ARCHIVES

Uncertain Weather: climate change through art and archives is opening on 2nd May at the Cheltenham Art Gallery and Museum. As part of this, the *Flood Archives* will be on display.

Artist Fiona Kam Meadley has been compiling a folk archive of the images and stories taken and told by Cheltenham residents of the 2007 floods. "This project is a collective memory of an extraordinary time – that also reflects today's communication technology." The archive currently contains over fifty video shorts, many posted on *You Tube* at the time. Still images, mobile phone footage and home videos taken by affected residents, schoolchildren, and office workers wading home in the flood waters.

LOCAL COMMUNITY STEAMS AHEAD IN ENERGY SAVING CHALLENGE!

Households from Wotton under Edge are showing how energy saving starts at home.

The Energy Neighbourhoods challenge was launched last November, with households receiving weekly energy saving tips and a variety of eco-gadgets to help cut their energy use, as well as support and encouragement from their local Energy Master and



advisors at the Severn Wye Energy Agency (SWEA).

Wotton Energy Watch is in competition with other groups of householders in Gloucestershire, as well as 8 other European countries. The winning Energy Neighbourhood will receive an eco hamper for every household, and a trip on the Eurostar to a prize-giving ceremony in Brussels. The contest lasts for 6 months and Wotton Energy Watch is currently in 3rd place in the whole of Europe.

Wotton's Energy Master Alex Alliston said "The 16 Wotton families have worked really hard to change their electricity and gas consumption habits, despite all the cold weather at the start of the year. We are delighted to be in 3rd place and there is a real





prospect that we could win the competition. There is certainly no shortage of enthusiasm or energy! amongst Wotton's Energy Watchers!"

ZERO-CARBON LIGHT-RAIL PROJECT NARROWLY MISSES AWARD

A revolutionary project, conceived jointly between Cheltenham Chamber of Commerce and Professor Frank Chambers, Head of the University of Gloucestershire's Centre for Environmental Change and Quaternary Research, has come second out of 26 university entrants in a national competition for innovation and reducing carbon emissions. The project is promoting ultra-light rail (ULR) to link Cheltenham Spa railway station with the town and with Cheltenham Racecourse, using an old rail trackbed that would double as a cycle-way and footpath. It is proposed that the revolutionary, lightweight trams be hybrid-powered, using hydrogen fuel-cells fed by 'green' hydrogen, which could be produced from a new Gloucestershire Waste Treatment facility. The idea is a remarkable win-win: it solves the county's massive waste-treatment problem, and creates a zero-carbon rapid transit system for a principal town, fuelled by a converted by-product of the waste treatment. This integrative system has the potential to be emulated in many medium-sized towns and cities across the world. NEW BOOK <u>GREEN ECONOMICS</u> BY STROUD-BASED AUTHOR MOLLY SCOTT CATO

Green Economics: An Introduction to Theory, Policy and Practice, Molly Scott Cato (London: Earthscan, 2009).

This new book by Stroudbased author Molly Scott Cato provides a blueprint for the new economy. It illustrates how the environmental and financial crises are two sides of the same coin, one caused by living beyond our means. The globalised marketplace is the prevailing force in our lives, undermining the real importance of our human communities and our planet. *Green Economics* argues that society should be embedded



within the ecosystem, and that markets and economies are social structures that should respond to social and environmental priorities.

'Here is a book which explains in clear terms the economic paradigm for the 21st century. Green economics is not new. As Molly Scott Cato makes clear, it has been growing alongside the environmental movement and now offers a vision of a just, sustainable and fulfilling economic life.' CLIMATE KICKS- ACT ON YOUR PATCH FOR BEES

As a balanced system starts to go out of equilibriumeverything fluctuates- this seems to be what we are observing with the seasons and weather events being not "normal". Just about everyone has noticed the decline in bee and butterfly numbers (and many other insects too). Changes in weather patterns are one of the pressures. Very early in the year we are getting extra warm days so bees are wakening and flying out at a time when very few natural flowers are in flower to provide nectar for them. If they can't find nectar they use up body reserves of energy. As weather goes back to winter again, they are very weakened.

If you have a garden or a patch of ground at work, plant some early nectar sources that stay in flower for long periods. Also keep a corner for ivy for late Autumn flowers that bees love and Yellow Brimstone butterflies and bats may hibernate in. Up in the high Cotswolds, Mahonia stays in flower through out the winter and is much loved by bees - the powerful fragrance is a treat too. Native Hellebores and snowdrops too were visited. Whilst it was so hot in March the very big bumble bees were feeding happily on pussy willow flowers in our garden. Bees also get propolis there too (essential for nest care). In my veg patch I keep an area of white day nettle and wound wort - they are excellent nectar sources for months, way in to Autumn, but watch out they can take over! FOURTEEN TREES MAKE AN ORCHARD

The orchard project, which was launched in January, encourages students to learn about biodiversity, nature conservation and healthy eating, the local sponsors have clubbed together to provide the sapling trees.

Mark said, "This has been a winning formula, bringing together support and sponsorship from local residents, businesses and groups. We used to be a town with huge tracts of orchard land – it's time we began replacing some of this."

MOVING BEYOND ORGANIC (article from Matt Adams/Good Gardeners Association)

With over forty year's experience of 'no-dig compost' gardening the aims of the Good Gardeners Association are *to improve and encourage horticulture*. Based in Wotton Under Edge, Glos, our latest project is called Moving Beyond Organic. The idea is that all food should be grown for nutrition and that minimum standards can be found and adopted to describe this.

Growing food organically probably offers the greatest hope for achieving this but it may not be the case for all organic food. Behind the label of organic certification, standards are slipping. As the industry gets bigger and more commercially orientated it's becoming just another part of the global food industry. Can we expect this food to offer maximum health or is it just about filling our bellies?

As gardeners we know that to enjoy the highest quality food we must grow our own. This puts us at the top of the chain for understanding nutrition. Adding the idea of freshness means local, well grown nonorganic produce may actually be more nutritious than some poorly grown and / or imported organic foods.

The idea of freshness (or vitality) adds another dimension to nutrition that is often overlooked. We believe this is essential if other nutrients such as trace minerals, vitamins and thousands of short lived nutrients (e.g. anti-oxidants) are to do their job effectively and promote long term health.

It's up to gardeners and local small scale producers, with a connection to their community, to begin setting the standards for better food. Eventually, the challenge could be passed back to farmers and supermarkets, if that's what we want. We then say grow food to this standard because it's guaranteed to promote health for humans and the planet.

Since 2003 we have been developing this idea through research and education. This year we have launched a national growing experiment involving four schools, one college and 25 GGA members spread around the country. All growing the same variety of carrots from either non-organic or organic seed or testing no-dig methods against digging we shall look at soil health in relation to crop health. No-dig Potatoes

April is a busy time and if you have any early varieties of potatoes you should make sure they are in the ground before the month is out. If you have an overgrown allotment potatoes are a great way of clearing ground, without too much effort. www.goodgardeners.org.uk/pages/4_articles_12.htm



(no-dig potatoes) - If ground is covered in weed try using cardboard. Cover the row and cut out a hole for spacing. Bed the seed into the soil and cover with compost. Mound up using more compost/manure or even weeds/grass clippings. Harvest when ready and follow on with winter veg.

LAUNCH OF THE EXCHANGE - STROUD

On May 14th 2009 The Exchange will be celebrating its launch! The Exchange is one of Stroud's latest success stories: having levered in over £200,000 in grants and loans from individuals keen to invest in their community, major refurbishments to the 1830's building are now under way. The building will probably be the greenest one in town, with photovoltaics generating our electricity, solar-heated water and ground source heat pump for underfloor heating. It will also be the most accessible building in the centre of Stroud, with two dedicated parking spaces, hearing loop in meeting and conference rooms, Braille signage, Easyread and large print documents and two fully accessible toilets, one of which will contain a shower for cyclists!

The business idea that drives the Exchange is simple: provide a high quality, state-of-the-art, fully accessible multi-use venue at affordable prices for community groups and the general public. Subsidise it by rental income from affordable shared workspaces for local social enterprises, charities and other not-for-privateprofit organisations. In turn, use surpluses for a local development fund for further such projects, particularly aimed at the vibrant artistic community. Add to this the work of the Social Enterprise Centre
