Vision 21's New Co-ordinator Andrew Jackson

I am proud to introduce myself as the new Vision 21 Co-ordinator, and would like to describe my background within the environmental field. In December 2003 I graduated from the University of Nottingham, successfully completing my Environmental Management M.Sc. with Merit.

I completed various leadership courses, one of which involved managing and co-ordinating an educational field trip for a class of 30 primary school children to a local nature reserve. In my gap year before commencing University, I participated in the Camp America Scheme and was made head counsellor during my second year of helping out with the scheme.

I have also participated in the School of Environment (University of Gloucestershire) Development Aid Project in Central Uganda. As part of a team, I planned and executed fund raising activities, took an ICT training course in the UK, and then travelled to Uganda where I set up a computer network, and trained local staff and students in a teacher education College. During this project, I assisted the Ugandan local government with their study of how nearby industry effected the water quality of Lake Victoria, Uganda, using specialist equipment.

During my M.Sc. my study of biodiversity was applied to a practical situation, working as a conservation officer for the British Trust for Conservation Volunteers (B.T.C.V). The work involved using biological knowledge in order to recover and establish an area of wildlife, which had been affected by a local industrial site.

Towards the end of my studies I was selected by an international environmental consultancy to take part in a major 9-month project. This involved assisting a multinational engineering company implement an Environmental Management System that met the requirements of the international standard, ISO 14001. The objective of the project was for the company to submit an application for a permit under the Integrated Pollution Prevention and Control (IPPC) Directive. This project not only gave me valuable project management skills but also formed part of my M.Sc. dissertation.

World Environment Day 2004 Cheltenham Youth Art Challenge

The World Environment Day theme selected for 2004 is **Wanted! Seas and Oceans – Dead or Alive?** The theme asks that we make a choice as to how we want to treat the Earth's seas and oceans. It also calls on each and every one of us to act. Do we want to keep seas and oceans healthy and alive or polluted and dead?

<u>Prizes</u> The overall winner will be awarded a days workshop for their school or youth group with a local artist to create a large scale version of the winning entry. Prizes, awarded in both age and category sections, will include a school or youth group visit and workshops at Nature in Art in Twigworth. I can assure you they are not!). Anything the leaders are able to organise.

How can I help? There is a big demand for places in the groups; we are limited by the numbers of volunteer adults willing to give up time and energy to run events and activities.
