The draft strategy, sets out what the council hopes to achieve over the next five years. It includes the council's proposed objectives for enhancing and protecting the environment. The plan will be reviewed each year with an annual budget and action plan giving greater detail.

The Warm and Well scheme works together with the local authorities, the NHS and the insulation company, Domestic & General, to provide information on home insulation, energy efficiency and how to claim a grant towards the cost of insulation.

Grants are available throughout Gloucestershire and South Gloucestershire. The great thing is that grants are available to all homeowners or private tenants. If you are in receipt of a qualifying benefit you may be entitled to free insulation. Grants are subject to availability and on a first come first served basis.

Gloucester City Recycling - You wanted to recycle more from home - now you can

Gloucester City residents are due to get a new recycling scheme from February 2010 enabling them to recycle more from home.

From 1st February, Gloucester City Council will be enabling residents to add items such as card, household domestic batteries and plastic bottles into their recycling boxes. As there will be more items in residents recycling boxes these will be collected weekly. The new service will also see the arrival of a new bin for weekly food waste collection. Enabling residents to recycle any food preparation waste or cooked food waste, diverting it from landfill.

To make sure residents are happy with the new collections the council's food waste team have been running a number of road shows throughout October and November at key sites in the city. Further events will be held in January on: 12th & 13th in Eastgate Mall, 14th at The Gateway Shop in Matson, 19th & 20th in Sainsbury's

Quays and 21st in Longlevens Co-op. The road shows are a chance for residents to speak directly with the waste team, giving their views on what they want and learning about the new changes.

A leaflet will soon be delivered to each household giving more details of the new service. There will also be an extensive marketing campaign and information available on www.gloucester.gov.uk in the New Year.

Two C or Not Two C? Little Mermaid; Little Progress in Copenhagen (reports and papers on Copenhagen from Vision 21)

The Co₂untdown to Co₂penhagen - Ban Ki-moon, the secretary general of the UN said that "the future of humanity depends upon these talks". Jim Hansen, NASA chief scientist, urged that Copenhagen must fail because political compromise would make any agreement worse for the climate than getting the right one. He is also fundamentally opposed to carbon trading, which is at the heart of climate treaties, which he compares to Papal indulgences that the Catholic church sold to sinners for redemption in the Middle Ages.

Global warming is all about degrees of temperature. For a number of years it was accepted that a 2C rise in global temperatures above pre-industrial levels would give an 'acceptable' chance of averting runaway climate change. We are already at 0.7C. Last year Jim Hansen said that this should be revised to 1C. At Copenhagen, the presidents of Bolivia and Venezuela called upon the world to minimize global warming to 1C, forecasting that above this, "many islands will disappear and Africa will suffer a holocaust." The Alliance of Small Island States (43 countries) protest at Copenhagen that any deal that allows temperatures to rise by more than 1.5C is 'not negotiable'. Their call was backed by a further 48 countries. The following day, the UN conference chief Yvo de Boer implied that this proposal had little chance of being adopted. Archbishop Desmond Tutu said: "We are facing impending disaster on a monstrous scale ... a global goal of about 2C is to condemn Africa to incineration and no modern development... it is better to have no deal than to have a bad deal".

A confidential UN analysis obtained by the Guardian stated: 'the emissions cuts offered so far at the Copenhagen summit would still lead to global temperatures rising by an average of 3C'. The newspaper article adds: According to the Stern Review: 'A rise of 3C would mean up to 170 million more people suffering severe coastal floods and 550 million more at risk of hunger, as well as leaving up to 50% of species facing extinction' And 3C implies runaway climate change.

What did the summit achieve? Given the heartfelt hyperbole, from the great and the good, heart-breaking little: A political agreement was brokered by China, South Africa, India, Brazil and the US, much to the surprise of the G77 (130 countries) who had not seen the text, but learnt about it by watching Obama on a TV screen informing the world about the deal - The Copenhagen Accord - a political statement not a legally binding treaty. The agreement said that 'the increase in global temperature should be below two degrees', but dropped the initial 80% reduction target by 2050 and failed to set any long term reduction targets. No date was set for global emissions peaking when this should be 2015 or earlier. Rainforests and crop mono-cultures such as oil palm plantations for biofuels became part of the carbon markets which is not good news for biodiversity, human rights, Southern civil society or climate change.

So where do we go from here? The talks are clearly undemocratic and billions of people in the majority world are not represented. We all need to make sure our MPs and governments are accountable to us so that they do the right thing on our behalf. As well as taking this national action, the prevarication of our leaders since the 1992 Earth Summit brings even more clarity to the legend: Think Global, Act Local. It really is down to us. Join a green NGO (there are local Friends of the Earth groups in Cheltenham, Forest of Dean, Cirencester, Tewkesbury and a fledgling group in Stroud. Get active with the Transition Town (TT) movement. There are TTs in Stroud, Newent, Minchinhampton, Gloucester, Bishops Cleeve and Vision 21 are acting as a catalyst to

get a group started in Cheltenham (see above for details). Dare we say join Vision 21? Vision 21 have joined the 100 Months initiative and 10:10 campaign. As a New Year's resolution sign up to green electricity and calculate your carbon, ecological and water footprints – and then reduce them.

2010, now officially the most important year for our climate, ever. And all because world leaders did not seal the right climate deal in Copenhagen. At the end of this year, they will try again, in Mexico. So where are we now?

Well, existing greenhouse gas reduction pledges will not halt emissions growth until 2040, 35 years after the 2015 target called for by the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change.
